Erie County Fair Historical Building Sign-up *August 8 thru August 19, 2018*

Buildings & Grounds

After several months of jacking and straightening the floor and replacing a major rotted beam, the Saw Mill is open and ready for demonstrations.

We are currently working on a new barn addition. It will be roughly the same size and the same look as the existing barn. Thanks to Chuck Facklam and 2 CAD students from the W. D. Ormsby Educational Center for providing the architectural drawings needed to receive a building permit. Over the next several months construction will be in full swing on the east end of the existing barn. Of course we are still in need of donations to complete the project. The idea was to start the much-needed storage and display area in stages. We are in the process of erecting a secure addition without a concrete floor. The temporary stone floor will remain until funds are available while the new structure will keep our farming artifacts protected and the second story will provide the much needed storage.

Crystal City

In 1891, a village was planned around the Spring Brook Station of the WNY & Penn RR on Pound Road. Approximately 120 acres of land was purchased for the development of a subdivision to be known as the Spring Brook Subdivision and was later known unofficially as Crystal City. It was situated on lots 94 and 95 on the north side of Bullis Rd. and on the west side of Winspear Rd. It was also south of Bullis Rd. on lot 95 and west of Pound Rd.

Approximately 90 lots were staked out, each measuring 25' by 100' and laid out in a grid pattern with streets and alleys servicing each lot. During the same time period, a trolley line was under construction crossing Pound Rd. in an east to west direction, approximately 100 yds. north of the 400 Expressway. The trolley roadbed can still be seen today, overgrown with saplings and brush. Whether the trolley line was planned in connection with Crystal City is not known.

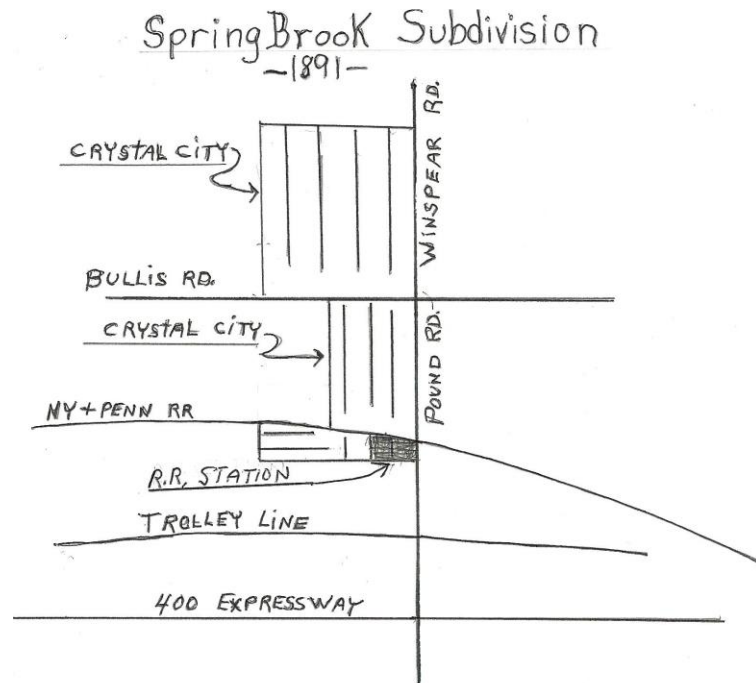
Crystal City turned out to be a failure as only a few individuals built a home on the development site. The trolley line was never completed, but the roadway berm remains there almost totally overgrown. This subdivision and trolley line could have contributed to major population growth in Elma in the early 1900's. Today there are only a handful of residents and commercial properties in that area.
